ACCESS TO INFORMATION

Implementation of the right of "access to information"

Outreach: Madagascar

Purpose: Reinforcement of the right "access to information" of the national constitution in Madagascar, Promote culture of transparency and accountability in Public Administration with respect to citizen's right to information

Measures: Strategic: advocating for access to information, creation of a platform to enable access to information

Technical: reinforcing capacity building: with an association of information professionals **Sensibilization**: addition of an appropriate concept of culture of transparency in the charter of access to information, collaboration with media and civil society

"I thank both of you too for sharing your point of view Right to information (and practically access to information) is not a real new thing for us as it is already stipulated in the article 19 of the Human right declaration. For us in Madagascar, it is also mentioned by in our national constitution. Now, many international, continental, regional, local charters reinforce it. The great question is: "how to implement it really and practically as we recognize that culture to secret dominates, especially in Public Administration; how to renverse an old tradition "Secret as norm with exceptions to transparency" as norm with exceptions?"

I would like to share with you our perspectives post 2015 in promoting transparency via access to information, as I already have done it in a session at IFLA CONGRESS 2015 in Cape Town in last August.

Those perspectives have been included in the implementation plan of our Malagasy National Development Plan (2015-2019) last April 2015. One of the goals in our National Development Plan is:

- Objective (goal): rehabilitate Administration and establish Authority of the State
- Specific objectives (goal): promote culture of transparence and accountaibility; Develop culture of information, transparency and accountability in Public Administration and with respect of citizens' right to information.

So, we will plan to realize some activities:

- *Strategic step*: continue in advocating and developing promotion of access to information, => with platform of access to information (a charter has been elaborated and signed in 2013 by public and private sectors to demand their engagement in access to information). it will be continued in 2016 as many ministries did not yet signed the charter.
- *Technical step*: develop a mechanism of access to information; reinforcing capacity buildings
- => with Association of Information Professionals.
- *Sensibilisation step *: appropriate of the concept of culture of transparency, all principles in charter of access to information,
- => with Medias and Civil Society

If you have comment, suggestion, do not hesitate to contact me or share it during this e-forum. We recognize that realizing those activities seems difficult as they need Public Authorities's acceptation, engagement even political will.

Availing information from such platforms as websites brings greater exposure of new ideas and knowledge to various categories of people and unparalleled access to contemporary issues that will open the minds of the marginalised communities in our midst.

Dissemination of public health information: key tools utilised by the NECOBELAC network in Europe and Latin America

Outreach: Europe and Latin America

Purpose: Reinforce open access principles to promote a cultural change of traditional publishing practices.

Measures: Capacity building through a flexible and sustainable training programme on scientific writing and open access publishing; creation of training tools based on semantic web technologies; development of a network of supporting institutions

"thank you for this very interesting discussions and hard work to promote information sharing for sustainable development goals at global level. I am a supporter of the Lyon Declaration and really appreciate HIFA's efforts in this regard and the implication of IFLA, FAO and COAR.

I work at the national institute of health in Italy and I am involved in cooperation activities in Latin America and the Sub Saharan Africa. Three continents (Europe, Latin America, Africa), witnessing a common effort to share health information at different levels, involving all stakeholders (researchers, editors, librarians, policy-makers, funders, patients, civil society, etc.).

I think the effort is not only technological, but it is mostly related to interpersonal relations. We should be able to find the appropriate language to make information clear and understandable to the different targets; and I do not only mean that local languages should be utilized, but also lay languages. It is important to find the best way to let people really understand the meaning of health-related information for health prevention and the benefits of utilizing it.

It is a question of responsibility: Researchers need the access to the most up-dated and valuable literature published in journal articles, editors should publish only reliable, open access information; patients need to be informed through other sources of information that they can really understand and use (including interpersonal communication), policymakers would need another language.

I think first step is creating awareness on the civil responsibility that everybody has in information transfer and the necessity to use the most appropriate communication strategies to really involve the different parties to play an active role in the information transfer process and take action.

We often used the "Train-the-trainer" approach which works at different levels, also within community health workers and patients' associations, and creates major involvement in those who learn and then become trainers at local level.

The experience carried out in Latin America and Europe as regard training in scientific writing and open access publishing is reported here http://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC3440589/

The same train-the-trainer model is now being tested in the Tigray Region in Ethiopia, but before applying it we are working on focus groups with AIDS patients, nurses and community based associations to better understand the real needs of those who will take part in future training activities.

I am grateful to this list which contributes to create awareness on these issues and provides very useful information and opportunities to share experiences.
